

The 7 Virtues


The seven virtues, rooted in classical philosophy and the teachings of Scripture (1 Corinthians 13:3), sum up the essential qualities we need to live faithful and flourishing lives. They are divided into the Cardinal Virtues and the Theological Virtues.

18 Common Logical Fallacies

1. AD HOMINEM	Attacking the person making an argument rather than the argument itself.
2. AD POPULUM	Assuming that something is true or good just because many people believe it.
3. APPEAL TO AUTHORITY	Arguing that a claim is true simply because someone with perceived expertise says it is.
4. APPEAL TO EMOTION	Manipulating emotions like fear or pity to win an argument rather than using valid reasoning.
5. APPEAL TO IGNORANCE	Arguing that a claim is true because it hasn't been proven false or false because it hasn't been proven true. Also known as "proof by lack of evidence."
6. BULVERISM	Dismissing someone's ideas because of their background or identity (a type of ad hominem).
7. CHRONOLOGICAL SNOBBERY	Assuming that newer ideas are always better than older ideas.
8. CIRCULAR REASONING	Using the conclusion of an argument as a premise to support the same conclusion. Also known as "begging the question."
9. EQUIVOCATION	Changing the meaning of a word in the middle of an argument.
10. FALSE CAUSE	Assuming that because one event happened before another, the first event must have caused the second. Also known as "post hoc, ergo propter hoc."
11. FALSE DILEMMA	Presenting only two options when there are actually more options available. Also known as "either-or," "false dichotomy," and "false binary."
12. GENETIC FALLACY	Judging something based on its origins rather than its merits.
13. HASTY GENERALIZATION	Making a broad conclusion based on limited evidence.
14. LOADED QUESTION	Asking a question that contains a false assumption.
15. RED HERRING	Introducing an irrelevant topic that distracts from the original issue.
16. SLIPPERY SLOPE	Assuming that if one event happens, it will inevitably lead to a series of other events.
17. STRAWMAN	Creating a distorted version of an opponent's argument and then attacking that instead of the real argument.
18. TU QUOQUE	Avoiding criticism by turning it back on the accuser. Also known as "you too."
